Mayor Devlin led with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Devlin (AD): At this point, Emily, would like to paraphrase what is going on.

Councilwoman Politi (EP): I actually didn't have anything prepared. Katie, do you want to paraphrase? I did have a thank you for the committee. That was all.

Trustee Brennan (KB): So, this is the comprehensive plan, and this is intended as an updated plan. The initial/last one that we've been currently operating with first came in in 2014, and the practice is to update these plans every five to ten years, so that was very much in line with that timeline and this has been about an 18 month/two year process. I'm looking at Dean for confirmation on when we actually kicked it off. But I think this has benefited from support from consultants, as well as a tremendous amount of community input through surveys, focus groups and also some stakeholder driven sessions. The long and the short of it is that this is intended to be a document that helps us chart our future and also really highlight some of the community priorities. Things that people view as challenges that we might want to consider addressing or looking for opportunities to address. And also highlight what's working well and what we as a community and the boards should consider continuing to support going forward. Hopefully this will be a really helpful document, and as you say Emily, thank you to everyone who participated and everyone who took time to respond to surveys and give input because we saw a lot of different faces at the events which was great.

EP: Yes there were surveys, a lot of stakeholder meetings, a lot of people put time and energy and feedback into this, in particular the steering committee, I see many faces in the audience and a couple online so thank you so much. It was more than a two year process, so the steering committee committed two years of their lives to seeing this through to the end, so thank you very much to those volunteers.

AD: And I think the only other thing worth mentioning is that this is not a back-and-forth Town Hall meeting. This is a chance for anyone in the public who wants to be heard to be heard. Anything else that I've missed?

KB: I think we had a question are we intending to go through a summary of this today, and the answer is not today because there was already an opportunity when the consultants came and gave us some feedback and a summary of what they put together so this is intended... a link to the document is available online and this is just intended, as Art said, as a listening exercise.

EP: And if you wanted to watch that summary presentation online it is June 10 and recorded on our YouTube channel. With that, are there public comments?

AD: I don't know how many public comments there will be but as always do we want to set a time limit?

EP: Sure, I'm happy to be a timer. We can do three minutes. Just state your name.

AD: Would anyone like to speak?

Dean Dietrich (DD): I'll start us off, maybe I can add something too. Let me see if I can do it in three minutes. It's always my challenge in meetings.

EP: You're on the clock Dean.

DD: Three takeaways: Number one: One positive thing is that there still are a lot of people out there that really care about this community. 150 people at the open house. 65/70 people at the elementary school. There was a lot of input. I think the other thing is we got some positive things out of this. This really also highlighted, and this is the background, you're not going to see that anywhere, cooperation between the village, the town and ROOST. Because the comprehensive plan also included DRI, and so the workshop included the DRI thing, Downtown Revitalization Initiative. ROOST was there for that. Adam was there. Got a lot of important findings from there. And also, the town used the meetings to get some information on the Horse Show Grounds. So, it was a very effective process, and it was effective because of the cooperation of the town, the village and ROOST. And it's something that the plan calls for, every plan I've been involved in calls for, so thank you for that. And finally, it's not a summary, but it's my perspective of being here for a long time, and being involved in this for a long time, there's a new definition arising, not a new definition, but I'd say it's been on a continuum... When I first came here in the 80s, we were worried about the character of the town and what it looked like. We were very concerned about visuals. We were very concerned about scale, remember Walmart? We were very concerned about open space. We were very concerned that what it looked like was our character. I think this is the first time that we really made the change that we looked at it and the character of the town is about the people that are in the town. And you're going to deal with that on Thursday. I think this comprehensive plan sets up what's going to happen in the next ten years. We are going to be negotiating and then walking a tightrope between keeping the character of the individuals, and also affordable housing. We look at this comprehensive plan, it's character, it's about art, it's about

healthcare, it's about education, childcare, it's about affordable housing. And so, that's going to change the look of the town a little bit, and as I say you're going to wrestle with that on Thursday... you'll change the look of the town, but you will increase the character of the town. And that's what this comprehensive plan sets up. It fits in what we've done in the past, starting moving to densities, the next challenge I believe is the Land Use Code. We'll take some credit for that. Bill Billerman and some other guys, Bob Marvin, Michael Clark had a foresight to start setting things up. And that's where we can start changing the look of the town and actually add density. I see this as a continuing of what's happened in the past and set up some challenges for the future. I want to thank again, I see a lot of people, I didn't bring a list of all the people on the Steering Committee, but it's on the first page, so I hope everybody looks at that and says thank you when they see those people walk by. Did I stay within the three minutes?

EP: No. I paused it.

DD: I talk until a bell rings.

AD: You did well though. Credit given.

EP: Thanks Dean.

AD: Anybody else? It's going to be an easy meeting. Anybody that's online have any comments?

Stephanie Pianka (SP): This is Stephanie Pianka. I was a member of the Steering Committee and I just wanted to say that I thought it was a very fair and open process and I think that there was a good balance in discussion to the needs of the community and maintaining community that's really accessible and available where it benefits all type of individuals in the community and maintaining that community spirit, so I'm proud to have been a part of the committee. I think the work is well done, even though it took us a couple years.

AD: Thank you. Anything worth doing is worth doing right, so thank you for sticking with it for two years. Going once? Going twice? Obviously, any of us are available for comment or questions in the coming days. Most of you have our phone numbers. The timelines we've talked about, this won't be voted on until somewhere in February, mid to late February. So there still is time. Is there anything I'm missing or ought to have said? I would just like to thank everyone who put the time and effort into this too. I'm doing all of the speaking, but I have nothing to do with this, so thank you all of you for all the work you did.

2025 HISTORICAL REPORT

TOWN OF NORTH ELBA

VILLAGE OF LAKE PLACID

January 17 - Asked about a candy store near where Dr. Erenstone had his practice. The candy Store was in front of Erenstone's. It was called "The Little Candy Store" by residents. The lady who owned the store was Kit or Kitty Lamory. Barbara Rand supplied the information. Inquiry from Peggy Jones.

January 22 - Inquiry from 1-352-693-5790 regarding information on Mildred Uihlelin's father. Did not record the person's name, just the phone number. Must have been having One of my days. (Cannot get my computer to stop capitalizing words at the Beginning of lines. Maybe you can read it like poetry.)

January 29 - Handed in my reports to Village and Town. Added bills.

February 3 - Question regarding founding of Lake Placid from Marc. Sent him the title "Plains Of Abraham." He was not interested in Lake Placid Club information and the way it fit into the population. Have not heard back.

Sent questions on Last Chance Ranch to LP News Archives.

February 6 - Marty Shubert and wife, Mary, texted with a link to a source on the Murders on Whiteface Mountain that I had heard about. Had trouble getting Websites that would have information but found that Tim Roland, a New York Times best selling author, wrote about it. It is still unsolved. Happened In 1924. It was the double homicide of Lake Placid guides George Martin (bludgeoned) and Jesse Crowningshield (shot). They were found near a trail they were Building for the Lake Placid SOA. The case "shocked the Adirondacks." The killer Was never caught.

February 21 - Spent 2 hours going through papers Bev left me. They are mainly her yearly Reports. They are now filed in binders and on my bottom shelf. (I miss her dearly.)

February 26 - Went to the library today at 10:30 and home at 2:00. Worked on filing Information that I have gathered so far this year from research, and from checking the Lake Placid News, that could be important for research. I do this Weekly and also gather weekly obituaries from the LP News. They are kept in a Picture album. I have been finding The Star, a weekly Essex County news-Paper, a source of information. Bambi found pictures of the bobsled run in 1979 - getting ready for the Olympics. John Morgan is coming in at 2:00. I will check with him on what we can supply Him with while Bambi is at lunch. Went to the Bookstore Plus and ordered "Tail Spin." It is about the killing of an LP Policeman and is a true story. I remember some things about the event, but was Young.

February 27 - Trees are coming down at the cemetery. Seems that many people are concerned. Talked to Shannon Porter who said the trees are old and diseased And a few have fallen. In order to protect the old part of the cemetery, they

Must be removed. Not sure if they will replant or put up a fence. Spent hours texting and on the computer for information on the planting of the original trees in the North Elba Cemetery. Looks like April 1916.

- February 28 - Going to library to look at "Bev's Bits" where she wrote about these same trees. Nothing in Bev's articles, but found a related article. It has been such a topic, That I decided to write an article for the LP News.
- March 1. Have sent the article to Shannon, but have not heard back. I will look at it one More time, then send it to the paper.
- March 2 - Worked on newspaper article for another 2 hours. Finally got some help from Shannon to make sure I have the facts straight.
- March 6 - Judy Shea called about newspaper article. Several other calls were received and All were positive. Shannon said the article was good. Lots of suggestions about how to replace the cemetery trees. They all want to talk and convince me that their idea is the best one.
- March 10- Town Board Meeting. Am going to discuss historical markers for a few buildings In North Elba and Lake Placid. I have been through the information a lot but am Still nervous. Everyone was great. They liked the idea and are ready to go. I am looking for an Article that Mary McKenzie wrote on the Stagecoach Inn. She corrected some Earlier ideas/facts she had recorded. (I am still unable to find the piece.)
- March 12- Talked to Dacia next door about an historical marker for the Stagecoach Inn. (I need an EIN Number from the Village.) Getting a marker is more involved than I Anticipated. I need deeds, testimony, and physical proof of the history of the Inn. Dacia is interested.
- March 15- Call from Katherine Preston 231-342-4647, looking for a connection to her parents Who lived at 30 Greenwood St. Not sure if they owned it. Father was Perry Raymond Preston; mother was Eleanor Preston. Got a picture on line. Large House - 6 bed 6 bath; found different information from different sources but main Facts are similar. Found the name of a person who used to live at that address And is now at 89 Greenwood. Richard F. Bechore. This brings up a Question: How much information should I give out? People often ask for phone Numbers. I sent Katherine the computer website so she could find it on her own.
- March 19- Ellen Smith called and suggested lilacs for the cemetery. Called Shannon who Said it would probably be just a fence.
- March 21- Several more responses to my article about the trees at the cemetery. Shannon Has become unreachable. I have several good suggestions if the Board wants to Revisit them. Shannon told me that the Board tabled talk on the cemetery and Replacement of trees.
- March 24- Dan Baker and business partner Mike Michanic are looking for history on the bar/ Restaurant they are revitalizing and opening. The library had a lot of information. I worked on examples of discrimination problems at The Club. Sent out.
- March 26- Chris at museum referred a question to me. Joyce at yahoo.com was looking for her Father's history. She thinks he went to a Jesuit school 1930-1941. I suggested it

May have been in Canada. Used to take the Ticonderoga ferry all the time.

April 2 - New computer is the works. Now for a printer. Also delivered Info to Mike Baker on restaurant building.

April 11- No one came today to help set up computer. Joe might come tomorrow.

April 12- Joe advises me to switch to Spectrum for the computer.

April 22- Lauri Dudley at town hall wants information about former town supervisor, Timothy Nash. Did not have much.

April 23- Scott (researching for a book) on LP Club regarding discrimination. Did hosting The Olympics have any thing to do with closing? (turns out that Scott was a good Friend of my brother Kevin in college. Put them in touch with other.

May 20- Channel 3 TV wants pictures of the Arena Grill. The library has several. Sent them to The Station. Also wants information on jerseys worn in games and tournaments. Gave them information. Advised them to contact the Olympic Museum.

May 22 - Request for information on burial site of George A. Dieterle by family member. Sent Them site information and who is maintaining the gravesite.

June 21 - Need to go to library to look up the names of the sponsors of the scholarship Nancy Beatty's Granddaughter received. Old scholarship. Men linked to Moose Island

July 3 - Library around 10:00. Got an ancient copy of "John Brown's Body" out of library And found my 1980 Olympic I.D. in it. Guess it hadn't been signed out since I Used it at school.

July 14 - Picked up boxes of books and papers that were Bev's. I gave some books to people Like Jay Rand who was in a couple. I donated some others to people and took Some to the museum.

July 25- Tracey Turger looking for information on a hotel that turned out to be the Chalet. They Had a summer post card and connected the hotel to their father. Chris at the Museum found a winter post card. We sent them to the site.

July 29 - Went to library today to do some copying and filing. Got a schedule for the NYS Historic Marker Program. It is a tight schedule and some required materials seem Impossible to collect.

Aug. 6 - Library. Could not find some files that I were sure were in the file cabinet.

Aug 10 - Did my Sunday task of cutting obituaries out of the Lake Placid News and adding Them to a scrap book. Most of rest of August was busy with FD activities.

Sept.17- Request from "Susie" to find Camp Armand. Sold in late 40's by her family. She Thought it was on Lake Placid. Family coming. (It was on the northern end of Lake Placid.)
1993 Camp Armand owner B.Lees Divine. 1896 SOA changed name of "Slide Mountain to St. Armand.

Oct. 7- Carol Hoffman made a date for Friday the 10th at 10:00 am to gather information on the

Torrance Farm. She is looking for a cabin somewhere on the farm land.

Oct.8 - Spent time looking for information for Carol Hoffman.

Oct 8 con't. Jim Morganson gave me some information from the soldier furlough program at the Club during WWII. His brother was stationed there after some active service. Donated articles are going to the library.

Nov. 16 - Met a photographer at the library and she will be taking pictures of the figure skating And other sporting events for a college degree from RIT.

Dec. 3 - Library today. Copied a lot of information from newspapers and filed it.

The Director at the museum, Carol, has done memorial plaques before and is helping Me with my goal of getting the museum building recognized. (Carol left before we Were able to get very far, but I am hoping the progress we made was kept on the Computer.)

The rest of December was spent trying to deal with fraud on my checking account And credit cards.
